The reminiscing of "days back when" can be heard amid clients sharing stories around the table. Clients have often shared stories about favorite Easter recipes and desserts: helping prepare fields on the farm to receive their new crops; planting vegetables and fruits in the backyard garden; relentless spring cleaning routines and chores shared by sisters and brothers; buying new dresses at the "dress shop" for the spring dance; attending truck rally races and tractor pulls. The experiences and knowledge passed around is endless and refreshing.

Adult day staff work creatively to offer clients activities that can bring these memories and joyful times to life. There are quite a few opportunities planned for the adult day clients this spring. Staff and clients will soon be making plans for our garden. They will be filling our planter box with fruits, vegetables and herb-plants that will later be used for baking activities and afternoon snacks. A promthemed dance is scheduled for Mav where hors d'oeuvres will be served and our juke box will be playing favorite songs from yester-year. ## **GVE Receives \$125,000 Transportation Grant**

Green Valley Enterprises Transportation Department recently received a 5310 government grant from the state of Wisconsin. This funding allows us to purchase two 2017 midsized buses. We will get the buses in the fall of 2017. The grant will cover the majority of the costs.

One of the buses will be used to replace a 2005 school bus with 300,000 miles. The new bus will result in saving money on operational costs while maintaining reliable and dependable transportation to meet the needs of our clients.

The other mid bus will be used specifically to support community inte-



grated activities that foster independence and employment. Clients will experience an expansion of community based trips and outings. These various activities will have an impact on clients achieving their personal goals and objectives.

The two new vehicles, along with the rest of the fleet, will have our new logo and branding on them. Look for the newest members of our fleet in the fall.

# **Birth to 3 Follows Best Practices to Coaching**

Birth to 3 has always been a fluid program that looks at current trends and studies and incorporates the findings into the over-all program.

Currently our Green Valley Birth to 3 Program has been striving to comply with best practices put forth by the state to implement a primary coach approach to teaming. The primary coach approach to teaming is defined as the use of a multidisciplinary, geographically-based team, where one member is selected as the primary coach. The member receives coach-

ing support from other team members, and provides direct support to the parents and other care providers using coaching and natural learning environment practices. The purpose is to strengthen parenting competence and confidence in promoting child learning and development.

The geographically-based team would be a group of early intervention practitioners consisting of (minimally) an early childhood educator, occupational therapist, physical therapist, speech-language therapist, and a service coordinator responsible for all referrals to our Birth to 3 Program within a predetermined area.

The primary coach approach to teaming uses coaching as an interaction style. Coaching is an evidence-based adult learning strategy used for talking with parents and other care providers to recognize what they are already doing that works to support child learning and development as well as building on ideas.



Our program currently has many of the coaching practices in place. Monthly staff trainings are currently taking place which are inching us closer to implementing the primary coach approach to teaming in Dodge Co.

What does all of this mean for our Dodge County Birth to 3 Program and how will it impact us? This is a question we continue to explore as we move forward with implementation. We do know that our Dodge County Birth to 3 Program will continue to provide the very best family friendly services we possible can while complying with the state Birth to 3 guidelines.

## **Grant Provides Training to Help with Employment Programs**

Green Valley Enterprises took the opportunity to write for the 'Building Full Lives in the Community' technical assistance grant from the Wisconsin Board of People with Developmental Disabilities (BDPP) this fall. The grant includes training from state and nationally known programmatic experts, to

help us learn how best to increase our community-based services for the future. We are honored to be one of only five organizations state-wide that have been awarded this opportunity in 2017.

Since being awarded in January things have moved along quickly with



GVE staff participating in several webinars as well as 3 days of on-site value stream mapping exercises. In the upcoming year Green Valley staff will continue to develop strategies to help expose people with disabilities to new and different experiences contributing to greater community inclusion.

Our outcome goals include moving individuals with diverse abilities from mere presence to active participation in community life through increasing customized employment opportunities. Our agency objective is to offer choices and self determi-

nation in daily activities. This grant will allow our agency to work with managed care organizations to provide such opportunities.

We thank the Employment and Production teams for taking on this new initiative to continue to provide the best services possible for our participants.

## **New Life Academy Location Update**

If you've driven past the former Haas property on Burnett and University Ave. you may have seen dumpsters being filled and emptied as old walls, flooring, plumbing and light fixtures are removed from Green Valley's new Life Academy location. The property is currently being renovated and should be completed early April.

As we plan for the move to the new location we are excited to contemplate all the new opportunities this centrally located property might be able to provide for individuals at Green Valley and students from surrounding area school districts.

The new building is handicap accessible and convenient to those that have physical limitations, something not available at our former Life Academy location on Prospect Ave. The space itself will be an open-concept plan that features large open spaces for future recreational use, areas for group video lessons regarding employability skills, computer lab access, kitchen cooking/

learning sessions, laundry instruction and the potential for space for small group programming or private counseling sessions.

We are excited about the potential for this building project to attract new community partnerships with area businesses and nonprofits in order to increase and develop services and supports that are individualized and full of choices for the individuals we serve.

GVE staff utilizes as much data as possible to decipher potential community sites for placement. The pre-vocation staff works directly with GVE em-

ployment specialists to find integrated community employment so the working relationship between the two departments and staff is vital.

The SNAP Department is a great place to spend the day! We work with clients, families and caregivers to provide a meaningful and productive day for every individual. We do this through the cares we provide: toileting, feeding and bathing as well as the many and varied activities we offer throughout any one day. We provide one-on-one activities, small groups, large groups and at the end of the week our "Fun Fridays" event in which every single client participates. Our daily activities promote skill maintenance and development in important functional areas. Our list of available resources is vast and our staff creative and fun.

Of all the activities we offer, outings into the community are one of the favorites and one of the most vital! Outings give our participants a chance to leave the department and explore new places in the community, have different experiences and meet people that they might not have the chance to otherwise. Being in the community promotes communication and socialization, not just within the group but with members of the community that we meet along the way. We practice appropriate manners and learn how we fit in to the complex system of working and living together.

We venture out into the community at least 3 to 4 times a week visiting an increasingly diverse number of local and outlying community venues. We have many local partners in Beaver Dam that we visit on a weekly/monthly basis including the Y for swimming and Fitness Friends classes, the Seippel Center for art therapy, the Watermark for Bingo, Tower Lanes for bowling and lunch, Beaver Dam Community Library, Walmart, Animart, Roger's Cinema, Dance Now and a wide variety of restaurants and ice cream parlors to name just a few.

When the weather turns nice we venture farther afield and take in museums, local events and seasonal attractions and some of our favorite annual events include the Dodge County Fair, Henry Vilas Zoo, a summer baseball game and a tour of the Capitol in Madison. This event is actually on tap for March 8th and is much anticipated (it includes a stop at the food court at EastTowne Mall, yum yum) by clients and staff alike.
