Individualized Plans for Employment Drive Services

Each day over 100 adults with disabilities head to Green Valley to take part in the Employment Services program. Every program participant has an Individualized Plan for Employment (IPE) that reflects short term and long

term career goals. Often it is a team of family members and professionals that help create the IPE.

Based on the IPE, participants receive the services they need to achieve the goals they have set. The majority of Employment Services participants hope to one day have a job in the community. Green Valley Staff create opportunities to obtain, sustain, or hone skills needed to meet that goal.

Prevocational curricula consists of hands on learning; be it on the work

Birth to 3: Still Making a Difference!

For the past 17 years and counting, Green Valley has delivered Birth to 3 services to families throughout Dodge County. Children with assessed developmental delays receive appropriate services from specially trained staff including, specially trained service coordinators, instructors

and therapists. Green Valley contracts with Rehab Resources who provide any therapies needed to lessen or eliminate delays.

Most of the 200 or so children that receive Birth to 3 services each year leave the program up to speed, and ready for 4K.

On Point by Jack Hankes, Executive Director



News editors have elevated two items in recent weeks, one being the fiscal cliff, and the other being the very public pregnancy of the Duchess of Cambridge. For one I'll leave the intense excitement to the Brits, and for the other I have a few thoughts that I'll share in this column.

The notion of a fiscal cliff is alarming in a number of ways, but the way in which it is alarming to me rests in the simple fact that we even have a cliff. Most of the math that we use these days is at least several centuries old, so it isn't as if Washington couldn't have seen this coming. We employ legions of budget analysts to endlessly evaluate and massage mountains of economic information, so I'd have to imagine that some staffer in Washington could have clearly predicted today's dilemma way before we'd ever have to characterize it as a cliff.

Since we've allowed politics to turn into a lucrative career, however, Washington's decision-making ends up being a vote acquisition process versus one centered on

problem-solving. It's been that way a long time, and everybody is involved.

As a result, our task becomes to bring some certainty into an uncertain world. The part we want to be certain about is the care, compassion, and professionalism that we bring to our work every day. That part cannot change as our clients and families depend on us for those things.

The uncertain part is largely external. We don't know what our economy will do next year. We don't know what the cost to implement the Affordable Care Act might be. We don't know the long-term prognosis for Family Care and other government initiatives like it, and we don't know where the Medicaid football is going to land.

For those reasons, our strategy has to be one that gives us the best odds for continued success, and we'll make decisions accordingly.
